## Annual Report 2021-22

## 1. Executive Summary

PRAYOG has been running a library initiative in Gopalganj district of Bihar. We intervene with 2898 children of Classes 1 to 5 in 18 Government schools, all in Kuchaikote block. The pandemic gave us an opportunity to explore other medium of reaching out to children and we started community libraries. We did not go online during the pandemic - we were physical and ensured children's contact with the books continued even when the schools were closed. We started 5 community libraries reaching out to 495 children and even after the re-opening of schools, we decided to continue - children pushed us to continue at their sites and so did the communities/their parents.

In a geography with low levels of literacy, poor pupil-teachers ratio, inaccessibility to the world of diverse children's book and lack of child centric pedagogy, Prayog has been ensuring that each child has access to diverse children's literature and can have the joy of reading. We do this through well designed library sessions which are full of activities - read aloud, story-telling, treasure hunt, book talk, story making, book discussion, various browsing games, and introducing a bit of literacy element. Prayog ensures that no child feels left out because of literacy related challenges and engages with children through a well curated collection which is age appropriate, has picture books, comprising of various genres and dealing with multiples themes like gender, environment, caste, class, religion, fantasy, equity, rights etc and offers to children as windows and mirrors to their lives and lives around them.

All this has emerged with generous support from donors like Nalanda Charitable Foundation and Wipro Foundation and we are learning each day. Relationships with organizations like Bookworm and their role in capacity building of our team has been immense. In 2021, Bookworm designed a Prayog Library Mentoring Support, which was a continuation to previous year's capacity building efforts with our team.

Our work has been highly appreciated by the District's Education Department and District Administration. We have been engaging with School Principals and teachers and get a big support from them. Schools, which are devoid of libraries, have ensured library rooms now. Even outside the district, Prayog's works have been accepted and we supported Purnea District Collector in his drive to activate panchayat libraries in the district. Other districts are also asking for support. NGOs like Quest Alliance which works with government schools in Samastipur have engaged us to train teachers and community library volunteers in the district. I-Saksham has approached us to facilitate a structured training on libraries for their team.

Over the next 2-3 years, we plan to scale our library work and also deepen our understanding on literacy elements and to include this in our school intervention plan. We plan to emerge as a resource organization in the region for engagement with children for library and literacy work.

# 2 Community Library Program

The **objectives** of the program are to:

- Access to diverse children's literature to children between Classes 1 - 5 in select 5 vulnerable communities. These communities are either in hard to reach 'diara' areas (flood affected) or dalit habitats of the villages
- Develop ways to engage with children's literature so that children understand the text/illustrations
- Engage with the parent's group and the village community for their acceptance and support in the implementation of the library program
- Liaison with Government Department at the local level so that the work is accepted and also replicated on scale by the system we already have success stories with this model being replicated in 237 panchayats in Purnea district and led by Purnea District Collector. This model has now been also accepted by Gopalganj District Collector and preparations are on whereby we are offering technical support to the District Administration. We have also been asked by Buxar District Collector to support in the district's plan for strengthening libraries.
- Building relationships with other key stakeholders -NGO partners, key individuals, donors etc so that the work gets larger acceptance

**Target group** are mainly children between the age group of 4 to 15

Operational model: a pool of trained library educators conducts weekly library sessions in the evening in their villages. The space is offered by the community and our team engages with children in different age groups during the session. In a typical library session, three groups are formed (ages 4 to 6, 7 to 10 and 11 to 15) and each of these groups are facilitated by a pool of 2 team members each. The books chosen are different for each age group and the activities are also different. The activities done with them to engage with these books are read aloud, story-telling, book talks, guided drawing, treasure hunt, book discussions etc.

After the session, each child gets to borrow a book which he/she can take to home for one week and return back in the next session. There is a 'book hospital' that we run along with children - all the damaged books get immediate attention and hence the book keeping is done with

- ii. **NO program was closed in this financial year**. In fact, we started new programs around capacity building of Government counterparts, NGO professionals on library work even outside the district
- iii. In terms of the overall operational/intervention model, there has been no change. We immediately started working back in the schools as soon as they opened after the lockdown. The engagement with teachers during the latter part of lockdown was not there as most of the teaching community were exhausted with the other tasks assigned to them for Covid response and hence we took a decision to pause. Our operational approach was streamlined with 15 days visit of Sujata Noronha from Bookworm in October 2021. Her visit was to review our library work and we focused on planning. One of the challenges that we have faced is the over burdening of our team as each day every team member conducts sessions in 2 schools and 1 community site. As a result, our planning and implementation was being compromised and hence we emphasised on effective planning, review meetings, supervision of sessions and interactions based on field notes. One day in a week has now been kept only for planning and preparation for next week's sessions in the schools and community sites.

We have an effective yearly planning calendar now and based on these quarterly, monthly and weekly plans are prepared. Even then, we still feel that we are short in team size and have

- reached out to Nalanda Charitable Foundation. Increasing the team size has been approved from their side and April 2022 onwards, we will be increasing the team size.

### b) Educational

i. The Founder and leadership team has directly engaged with student, content, teachers and other key stakeholders during this period.

The planned sessions with students are facilitated and supervised by the leadership team being led by Binit and other colleagues. Surya plays a role in designing of the sessions and piloting it out before handing it over to the larger team with the help of Binit. The planning calendar has been led by Surya and then as a result of a number of brainstorming sessions with the team. Surya also plays a role in supervision of implementation of activities in the schools and community sites. The nurturing of the team is led by both Surya and Binit.

The content related to activities are designed by Surya and Binit - these contents include games/activities related to opening up of the collection keeping in mind the context of our children. The preparation of session plans and reviewing the quality/quantity of work is also taken care by them. One of the core responsibilities of Surya is to nurture the next level of leadership in the new (relatively) team members.

Surya's responsibility is also to build relationships with Government system, mainly the District Collector and advocate for libraries. Based on Prayog's library learning, an entire district has witnessed active panchayat libraries (Purnea) and Gopalganj is also starting on similar lines. The Education Department and District Administration are well aware of Prayog's works. Binit takes a lead in strengthening and maintain rapport with Block level officials (BEO, BRPs). Our other team members maintain rapport with School Principals and teachers.

Maintaining a rapport with donor agency and routine discussion on key gap areas is the key responsibility of Surya. Building relationships with other NGOs and serving their needs is also taken care by Surya, one such concrete example is with Quest Alliance in Samastipur district.

- ii. Our team has witnessed significant transition in educational understanding over the past year and a lot of it has been possible because of the constant engagement with the larger Bookworm team through a structured Prayog Library Mentoring Support, which occurred in two phases one in 2020 and the other in 2021. Some of the key transitions are:
  - Understanding the text/story grammar: children's literature is very complex and identifying various elements of story grammar like plot, theme, topic, genre, age group, problems in the story are somethings that our team has evolved with and emerging their understanding every day

- *Knowing good books:* based on the above, we are clearer now on the books which are good to be added to our collection
- Incremental approach in engaging books/activities with children: our team now
  knows and thinks about childhood diversity. We know that all children are not the
  same and context plays a big role. For eg. Children of the similar age group in a dalit
  community and a relatively better off community needs different ways of
  engagement, even the choice of books and activities with these books need to be
  different and this is the kind of acceptance and learning that we are emerging with
- Showing signs of empathy with all children: all our team members have had their own journeys when they joined us and none of them had the privilege of studying in an institution of repute. What they are going through in Prayog has made them to empathise with the children with them they are reaching out to during their interactions/sessions. A child who cannot identify an alphabet/word is now not getting that feeling because the activities are designed in such a way or the engagement is done in such a way that there is someone to help. ## c) Organizational

i. Legal Status: We have our 12A and 80G certificates. We have no plans to apply for FCRA as we have a firm belief that any funding support would be met with a diverse pool of donors within a country only

#### ii. Team Structure:

The team profile is as below:

**Surya Prakash Rai (Founder):** an M.Phil from IIT Bombay and has worked for various national and international NGOs for past 10 years. Takes care of all the operational aspects of activities at PRAYOG.

**Abhishek Kr. Sharma (Co-Founder):** a BE in Electronics engineering from BIT Mesra and MBA from XLRI Jamshedpur. Takes care of creating forward linkages and fundraising

**Binit Ranjan (Library Educator cum Program Coordinator):** is a MSW from IGNOU and has been taking care of field operations by activating the school libraries, introducing classroom libraries and other. He has been associated with PRAYOG as a Program Co-ordinator since May 2017. He is also a Wipro Fellow

**Kailash Kumar (Library Educator):** is a Graduate and has been taking care of field operations by activating the school libraries, introducing classroom libraries and other. He has been associated with PRAYOG since July 2019

**Ragini Kumari Sharma (Library Educator):** is a Graduate and has been taking care of field operations by activating the school libraries, introducing classroom libraries and other. She has been associated with PRAYOG since Sep 2020

**Anita Kumari (Library Educator):** is a Graduate and has been taking care of field operations by activating the school libraries, introducing classroom libraries and other. She has been associated with PRAYOG since Sep 2020

**Durga Kumari:** we have selected her as a part of our Managerial team member. She is a B.Ed from RIE Bhubaneshwar and MSW from TISS, Guwahati. She hails from Patna; has 3 years of work experience with Shiksharth (Sukma).

She joined us on May 01<sup>st</sup>, 2021 and continued till March 15<sup>th</sup>, 2022. She was getting married and her partner works with Shiksharth (Sukma) and she also had health issues and wanted to spend time with her family post marriage.

We have plans to diversify our team and we are in discussion with Kuheli Sarkar, a Kolkata based freelance Consultant. Kuheli has a M.A. in Education from TISS Mumbai and she has also pursued LEC. We have invited her for a site visit in the first week of May and if both Kuheli and Prayog team aligns to the vision, we shall go ahead in including her in the team. Though, it would be part-time engagement. Apart from this, we would be including 2 new full time female library educators and a pool of 10 volunteers, all hired locally.

We are a very small team but we highly respect the basic ethics of team work, self-respect, child rights awareness and stakeholder engagement. We have set protocols for all of these and the second line of leadership is being prepared right from the beginning. We are the phase of nurturing and building a strong core team and an implementation team.

The organization has initiated to adopt social security measures for its team and for the first time, we introduced "Health Insurance" of all staff with a 70:30 ratio last year but later on in 2021 we decided to make it a 100% contribution from organization's side. We follow a salary increment process. We take extremely care of our team's needs and extend any support to them as and when required.

For the first time in past 5 years, we had a team member leaving us and that too without completing a year with us.

- iii. **Capacity Enhancement**: for the capacity enhancement, we make a list of trainings that are being offered by Wipro or their partners and then based on individual's interest and requirements of the program, we urge to apply for these trainings. Apart from that we have also kept separate budget head for capacity building under NCFs support. For eg. We were able to cover cost of PLMS II training by Bookworm through that budget.
- iv. **Governance**: there is a Board of Trustees who take any decision with the inputs from the staff. Apart from this, we have two advisors who suggest us on our stand in the programs or relationship with stakeholders.
- v. **Financial Overview**: In Feb 2020, we received our first funding support from Nalanda Charitable Foundation (NCF) to strengthen our library program in Government schools. The budget sanctioned was Rs 12 lakhs due to lockdown restrictions, we could use only 50% of the allocated budget. In July 2021, our grant size was doubled by NCF to Rs 25 lakhs and in 2022 as well, this will grow as we have been approved to increase the size of team. Though, we will take a call to increase the number of schools soon.
  - Our finance records are audited/filed annually by a CA firm and we comply to income tax laws/rules since the beginning of the organization.
- vi. **Other Partnerships**: we have a strong support from the District Administration and we have a letter of Approval from them to implement our library work in these schools. As an organization, we are just 7 (so far) but we are working with unmatchable energy of school teachers, BRPs, BEOs, DPOs, DEO and District Collector. In March 2021, we have partnered with Purnea District Administration as well for supporting them in their vision around libraries

## 3. Plans for next 1-3 years

For the next 3 years, PRAYOG would be focusing on:

i. Deepen our existing work on children's library

- ii. Expanding the outreach to 10 more schools in the district and overall turn all the implementation schools into model for library and foundational literacy and numeracy indicators
- iii. Emerging as a local organization with a pool of trainers for library and literacy/numeracy
- iv. Developing effective training packages for the above
- v. Start a community site of our own which will also serve as a demonstration centre and training site for the above. In March 2022, PRAYOG leased 25,600 sq ft land in Gopalganj for this for 29 years
- vi. Based on Purnea experience, we are supporting Gopalganj district administration in their library visioning. Similarly, Buxar District Collector has also reached us for support and we plan to take this ahead to other districts as well. Till some time back, no one talked about libraries and it's nice to see that people are now at least thinking about libraries!
